

ALABAMA

Marion National Fish Hatchery

Forest preservation work in this national hatchery in Perry County will be conducted under a \$40,000 allotment which will create 48 man-months of employment. The project will be supervised by the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife.

CALIFORNIA

Eureka Project

The Bureau of Land Management's Eureka Project, in Humboldt County, has been allocated \$250,000 for construction of access roads in the King Range area, providing access to this scenic mountain region. An estimated 180 man-months of on-site employment will be utilized during the construction phase.

Ukiah Project

A \$6,000 project has been authorized for the Bureau of Land Management in Mendocino County, which will include a 260-acre spraying project for control of forest pests, 30 acres of site preparation, and construction of two miles of fire breaks on the Ukiah Project. The work involves 10 man-months of new employment.

Visalia Project

An additional \$75,000 has been approved for further construction on the Lamont Meadows and Rockhouse roads in Tulare County by the Bureau of Land Management. The additional funds, which bring the project total to \$255,000, will provide further employment of an estimated 60 man-months.

Hoopa Valley Reservation

A previously authorized forest preservation and multiple-use development project on the Hoopa Valley Reservation, near Humboldt, by the Bureau of Indian Affairs has been expanded by an additional \$50,000 allotment, which will provide 90 man-months of employment, thus bringing the total value of the project to \$100,000 and employment to 180 man-months.

COLORADO

Montezuma Project

Work in Montezuma County by the Bureau of Land Management will consist of 50 acres of site preparation and tree planting, construction of 10 miles of fire breaks, and hazard reduction and forest tree seed collection on 100 acres. The investment of \$21,000 is expected to create 24 man-months of employment.

Archuleta Project

Work planned in Archuleta County by the Bureau of Land Management includes 130 acres of site preparation and seeding, realignment of 10 miles of forest access roads, 3 miles of protective fencing, 10 miles of fire breaks, and 120 acres of hazard reduction. This project, valued at \$43,000, will create 48 man-months of on-site employment.

IDAHO

Coeur d'Alene Reservation

A new forest preservation and multiple-use development project in Idaho, planned by the Bureau of Indian Affairs, will involve an investment of \$27,000 on the Coeur d'Alene Reservation, in Benewah County, and will provide 48 man-months of employment.

MAINE

Craig Brook National Fish Hatchery

In Hancock County, \$20,000 will be invested in forest-preservation work at the Craig Brook National Fish Hatchery under supervision of the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife. Twenty-four man-months of employment will be generated.

MICHIGAN

L'Anse Indian Reservation

A \$50,000 increase in the previously authorized forest-preservation and multiple-use development project on the L'Anse Indian Reservation, in Baraga County, by the Bureau of Indian Affairs will provide an additional 90 man-months of employment. The new work will bring the total investment in the project to \$65,000 and total employment, to 114 man-months.

MINNESOTA

Northern Minnesota Reservations

Cass County has been added to the previously authorized forest-preservation and multiple-use development project planned by the Bureau of Indian Affairs on four Indian reservations in six other counties--Becker, Beltrami, Mahnomon, Itasca, Koochiching, and St. Louis--in northern Minnesota. The work in Cass County is valued at \$50,000 and will provide 90 man-months of employment. The entire project is now valued at \$170,000, and 306 man-months of employment are involved.

Tamarac National Wildlife Refuge

A \$100,000 forest-preservation project on the Tamarac National Wildlife Refuge in Becker County, will be directed by the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife. The project, which will create 120 man-months of employment, is scheduled to begin within 30 days.

NEVADA

Lincoln Project

An additional \$40,000 has been approved for construction of the Bureau of Land Management's Ella Mountain fire lookout, and realignment and grading of the Ella Mountain road. The project will provide 48 more man-months of employment. Total Accelerated Public Works funds available in Lincoln County for the Bureau of Land Management are \$123,000.

Mineral Project

An additional \$40,000 has been approved for the Bureau of Land Management to grade and realign the Cottonwood Canyon road in Mineral County, resulting in 48 man-months of employment. Funds for the Mineral Project now total \$96,000.

NORTH CAROLINA

Eastern Cherokee Reservation

An additional \$100,000 allotment will enable the Bureau of Indian Affairs to extend forest-preservation and multiple-use development work on the Eastern Cherokee Reservation into Jackson County. Only Swain County lands were to be improved under the earlier authorization. The new allotment will provide 180 man-months of employment and bring the total investment to \$200,000 and the man-months of employment to 360.

OREGON

Roseburg Project

Timber-stand improvements and construction of additional sanitation and protection facilities by the Bureau of Land Management will be provided by a further allocation of \$22,000 for the Roseburg Project in Douglas County. The investments, creating 24 man-months of employment, will be made at Wolf Creek and Little River. The project now totals \$311,000 in Accelerated Public Works allocations.

Salem Project

The Bureau of Land Management will improve timber stands, reduce forest hazards, collect seeds and construct protection and sanitation facilities at Fisherman's Bend in Marion County with \$134,000 approved for the Salem Project. The work will create 144 man-months of new employment beginning in October.

Warm Springs Reservation

The forest preservation and multiple-use development project planned at the Warm Springs Reservation in Jefferson County has been expanded by an additional allotment of \$100,000 and will provide another 180 man-months of employment. The work, to be undertaken by the Bureau of Indian Affairs, is now valued at \$200,000.

Columbia Project

A project valued at \$13,000 has been approved for the Bureau of Land Management in Columbia County for expansion of protection and sanitation facilities at the Scaponia Recreation Site. The work involves 24 man-months of employment and will begin in October.

Josephine Project

An additional \$200,000 has been approved for the construction and surfacing of the "D" section of the Galice forest access road. Total funds now available for this Bureau of Land Management Project are \$400,000. With the additional funds, 130 man-months of on-site employment will be created.

Wasco Project

The Bureau of Land Management has received approval for an additional investment of \$10,000 for reforestation work and realignment of forest access roads in Wasco County, creating 10 man-months of further employment. Total funds for the Wasco Project are now \$15,000.

Yamhill Project

Extensive forest improvements are scheduled by the Bureau of Land Management in Yamhill County, with an allocation of \$53,000. The work, providing 48 man-months of new employment, will include slash reduction on 100 acres, reforestation of 440 acres, site improvement on 1,000 acres, and allocation of forest tree seeds.

Albany Project

In Linn County, the Bureau of Land Management has received \$60,000 for timber stand improvement, seed collection, rodent control and hazard reduction, and grading of forest access roads. The investments will create 60 man-months of employment.

Bend Project

An additional \$52,000 has been added to the Bureau of Land Management's Bend Project in Deschutes County, for timber stand improvement and forest rodent control. It will add 36 man-months' employment to the project, now totaling \$97,000 in investments.

Klamath Falls

In Klamath County, \$50,000 has been allocated for construction of the Bureau of Land Management's Brian Mountain Lookout, and snag felling on 1,640 acres. Forest seeds will also be collected. The project will create 48 man-months of new employment.

North Bend-Coos Bay Project

In Coos County, an additional \$150,000 has been approved for construction on the Elk Creek timber access road system in the North Bend-Coos Bay Project area. The new work for the Bureau of Land Management will add 110 man-months of employment. This project now includes investments of \$287,000.

PENNSYLVANIA

Lamar National Fish Hatchery

The Lamar National Fish Hatchery in Clinton County will receive \$15,000 in forest-preservation work under the supervision of the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife. Some 18 man-months of employment will be created starting within 30 days.

WISCONSIN

Necedah National Wildlife Refuge

In Juneau County, \$100,000 will be invested in forest-preservation work on the Necedah National Wildlife Refuge by the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife. An estimated 120 man-months of employment will be provided beginning within 30 days.
