

ARIZONA

Winslow Base. This camp is designed for 300 enrollees and is located on the Navajo Reservation eight miles from the town of Winslow in Navajo County. The Bureau of Indian Affairs has facilities available at this site. The enrollees at this camp will be involved in streambank protection and stabilizations, channel erosion control, fencing, brush control, windbreak and shelter-belt planting, and road improvement. They will also assist in community improvements for schools and community centers, recreation development programs at Canyon Diablo and Grand Falls and in the rejuvenation of prehistoric ruins.

CALIFORNIA

Lewistown. Facilities are available for 200 enrollees at this site in Trinity County one mile south of Lewistown and about 35 miles from Redding. This camp is located on Bureau of Reclamation land. The enrollees will assist in roadside fire hazard reduction in the Trinity Lake area and the construction of campgrounds and picnic areas. In addition to these projects, the enrollees will be engaged in making property line surveys, assisting in helispot construction, fuel break construction, recreation and administrative road construction and rehabilitation and construction of trails.

Ryan. This camp site, on National Park Service land, is 14 miles from Death Valley National Monument in Inyo County. The 100 enrollees will be given the opportunity to work in many phases of wildlife and land management including development of game watering holes, game management and protection, and erosion control; conservation, preservation and interpretation of natural features, including fencing, walks, trails, exhibits and displays.

Toyon. Most of the necessary facilities for 100 enrollees are available at this camp site on Bureau of Reclamation lands. It is 13 miles from Redding in Shasta County. This area provides tremendous opportunity for conservation work--wildlife habitat improvement, timber stand improvement, timber planting and seeding and trail rehabilitation and construction. In addition, the enrollees will construct campground and picnic areas and timber access roads. Major projects the enrollees will assist in will be the Shasta-Keswick Erosion Control Project, and roadside fire hazard reduction in the Shasta Lake area.

COLORADO

Collbran. This Job Corps camp is in Mesa County, approximately $\frac{1}{2}$ mile west of the town of Collbran and 40 miles northeast of Grand Junction on Bureau of Reclamation land. Partial facilities are available, but considerable construction at the site will be necessary. The enrollees will be involved in clearing trees and underbrush from the perimeter of reservoirs, constructing trails and access roads, seeding canal banks and other denuded areas, improving water courses, eradication of noxious weeds, and other soil and moisture conservation activities.

MARYLAND

Catoctin. This camp is located adjacent to the southwest boundary of National Park Service's Catoctin Mountain Park in Frederick County. It is about 20 miles from Hagerstown. The design size is for 100 enrollees and complete facilities are available on the site. One of the major work projects the enrollees will undertake will be the renovation and rehabilitation of nearby camping areas. In addition, they will be involved in landscaping, construction of road gates, bridges, and campfire circles, and in preparation and erection of trail signs.

MASSACHUSETTS

Wellfleet. This camp is in Barnstable County on the eastern shore of the Cape Cod National Seashore. It is approximately 30 miles from Hyannis at the site formerly occupied by Army Camp Wellfleet. The enrollees at this camp will be working in the areas of Provincetown, Truro, Wellfleet and Eastham on projects such as construction of recreational facilities, trail construction, reforestation, and beach erosion control.

NEW MEXICO

Mexican Springs. This Job Corps camp is on land within the Navajo reservation. It is approximately 23 miles from Gallup in San Juan County and designed for 100 enrollees. The boys will be involved in timber stand improvement, red rot sanitation, tree planting, brush control and reseeding, erosion control and water spreading, fencing, development of foot trails, road improvement, and the development of community outdoor recreation facilities.

NEW YORK

Iroquois. This camp is on the Iroquois National Wildlife Refuge, which is operated by the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife. It is in Genesee County, about 18 miles from Batavia. Proposed projects for the 100 enrollees are: timber and brush clearing, development of upland game habitat, fencing, construction of an overlook parking area, and repairing and maintaining equipment.

OREGON

Tillamook. This camp, on Bureau of Land Management land, is located at the Tillamook County Naval Air Station about 75 miles from Portland. There will be 200 male enrollees at this camp. The boys will be working on construction of recreation facilities, road construction, timber stand improvement, reforestation, fire hazard reduction, and logging.

UTAH

Freeport. The camp site is in Davis County, three miles from Clearview, on Bureau of Reclamation land. Enrollees will gain experience in landscaping and tree planting, erosion and weed control practices, and irrigation systems. During the first year, the major project for the enrollees will be the development and conservation of the Willard recreation areas and reservoir. They will also be engaged in construction of access roads and parking areas.

VIRGINIA

Triple Shrine. This Job Corps camp is in the National Park Service's Colonial National Historical Park, near Yorktown in York County. The enrollee capacity is 200 men, and complete facilities are available. The enrollees will be working on maintenance, preservation and improvement of physical facilities and lands in a park interpreting 17th Century and Revolutionary period events. Work includes such jobs as construction of roads, trails, buildings, picnic areas, utility systems, historic-type fences, and studies in the protection and preservation of plant life and wildlife in park areas.

WASHINGTON

Fort Simcoe. This Job Corps camp is on the Yakima Indian Reservation in Yakima County, 20 miles from Toppenish. Many facilities are presently available at this camp, which has been designed for 200 enrollees. The enrollees will be concerned primarily with timber and range conservation practices, such as timber thinning and construction of fire roads and trails.

WYOMING

Casper. This Job Corps camp for 100 enrollees is near the town of Casper in Natrona County. All facilities are available at this Bureau of Reclamation site. On reservoir areas, the boys will construct access roads and trails, boat docks, bathing beaches and bath houses and picnic facilities; plant trees and grass, and work on erosion control projects. They will replace worn-out water structures, construct operating roads, install culverts, and work on erosion control and eradication of land and aquatic weeds on the Kendrick Project.
