Wingate High School Demolition Dominates 2012 Space Reduction

256,000 square feet of buildings removed from the Indian Affairs facilities inventory.

The FY2012 demolition of Wingate High School and its dormitories is the largest single space reduction project in recent years. It will be followed by the demolition of Wingate Elementary School and its dormitories in FY2013. The Wingate school complex is located just east of Gallup, N.M.

OFMC's Operations and Maintenance (O&M) formula sets educational facilities O&M funding at \$5.35 per square foot. Thus, the demolition of 256,000 square feet of the Wingate High School buildings saves \$1,369,600 in O&M funding annually.

Additional Indian Affairs space reduction will be achieved this year, following the environmental remediation (primarily asbestos removal) of the old school buildings at Ojo Encino, Pueblo Pintado and Crownpoint, all located in New Mexico.

For FY2012, The OFMC Space Reduction Program will exceed the 300,000 square feet called for in the FY2010 Government Performance Results Act (GPRA).

FY2011 was a banner year for space reduction—721,711 square feet of buildings were demolished or transferred from the Indian Affairs inventory. Three major individual projects highlighted that year: Cherokee Central Schools in North Carolina, Chemawa Indian School dorms in Oregon and Polacca Day School in Arizona.
