The Office of Indian Economic Development (OIED) Division of Economic Development (DED) provides grant funding and technical assistance to support Tribes in developing and sustaining economic vitality.


Non-Awardee Assistance

DED's Economic Development Specialists assist Tribal applicants who are not awarded DED grants by conducting individual follow-up to identify alternate resources for proposed projects. This year, the team provided individual follow-up to **25** applicants who were not awarded DED grants. Alternate economic development resources are also provided on the <u>OIED website</u>.

2022-23 Technical Assistance

Annual OIED Grantee Meeting (July 31 - August 2, 2023)



2022-23 NATIVE Act Progress

DED utilizes all its program areas to support Tribes and Native Hawaiian Organizations in building capacity for tourism pursuant to the Native American Tourism and Improving Visitor Experience Act (NATIVE Act). In 2022-23 DED funded **\$4.2 million** in NATIVE Act initiatives.



OIED Economic Development Zones



- → **\$1.1 Million** in grants for Native Hawaiian tourism initiatives that incorporate traditional knowledge and cultural practices.
- → Grantee Meeting presentations on indigenous tourism strategies, including best practices from Hawaii, Panama, and Guatemala.
- → **30 grants** awarded to Tribes/Tribal organizations for tourism feasibility studies and business plans.
- → **Cooperative Agreements** with the American Indian Alaska Native Tourism Association (AIANTA), Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, and George Washington University to assist Tribes in building tourism capacity.
- Technical assistance workshops, including a DED webinar on Fundamentals of Grant Writing presented by AIANTA's Tribal Relations & Outreach Manager.
